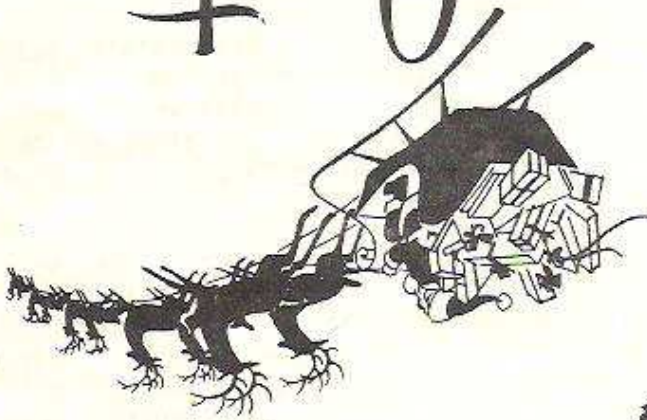

(WILL LEAVE YOU TO WONDER ABOUT EVERYTHING ELSE) NEEDLESS TO SAY, WE HAD A WONDERFUL TIME.....THANKS TO GUS & NEVA BRINING AND MARIETTA & HOWARD WALTHERS, OUR HOSTS' & HOSTESSES'

THIS WAS A DELIGHTFUL CAMPGROUND FOR A RALLY? OUR CAMPSITES WERE NEAR A HUGH SHELTER HOUSE WITH A FIREPLACE AT ONE END AND A KITCHEN AT THE OPPOSITE END.

THUR. WAS SPENT GREETING, VISITING, REGISTRATING & COACH-HOPPIN' -- SOME WENT SHOPPING, PICKING BLACKBERRIES OR JUST ENJOYING THE GROUNDS. IN THE EVENING, THE MGR. TOOK US FOR A HAY-RIDE - PULLED BY A HUGH 1935 EAGLE-6 TRACTOR. HE TOLD US ABOUT HIS FARM AND HOW HE STARTED THE CAMPGROUND. WE ALSO WENT THROUGH HIS PET CEMETERY. FOLLOWING THE HAY-RIDE, DON RICHARDSSHOWED SLIDES OF CAESARS CREEK PIONEER VILLAGE. HE TOLD US OF HOW THEY WORKED AND RESTORED THE VILLAGE BUILDINGS AND WHAT THEY ARE DOING TO RAISE FUNDS FOR THIS PROJECT.

FRI. AFTER COFFEE, WE ALL ATTENDED A TOUR OF THE CAVEN'S MEAT PLANT. THIS WAS A MOST INTERESTING TREK AND THE SPICE ROOM AND THE HICKORY-SMOKED HAMS, CERTAINLY MADE YOU HUNGRY. THE EARLY PIONEER FARM-LIFE, COOKING, SPINNING, WEAVING AND CANDLE-MAKING IS ALWAYS OF INTEREST. WE THEN WALKED TO THE INDIAN MUSEUM AND GOT A LOOK AT INDIAN LIFE-STYLE WITH FULL-SCALE MANNEQUINS AND DISPLAYS OF ARTIFACTS OF THE INDIAN TRIBES WHICH INHABITED THE OHIO COUNTRY DURING THE PERIOD :: 1650 THRU 1850. WE ALSO SAW THE OLD CANAL SYSTEM, LAID OUT IN THE 1820's -- TO CONNECT LAKE ERIE TO THE OHIO RIVER. OHIO HAS NEARLY 1,000 MILES OF CANALS. AFTER THE TOUR, WE WENT TO -- "DUFF'S" FOR DINNER, WHERE A PLEASANT SURPRISE GREETED US.....DOT FEARING, HER SISTER & NIECE GREETED US ::: AND JOINED US FOR DINNER. 

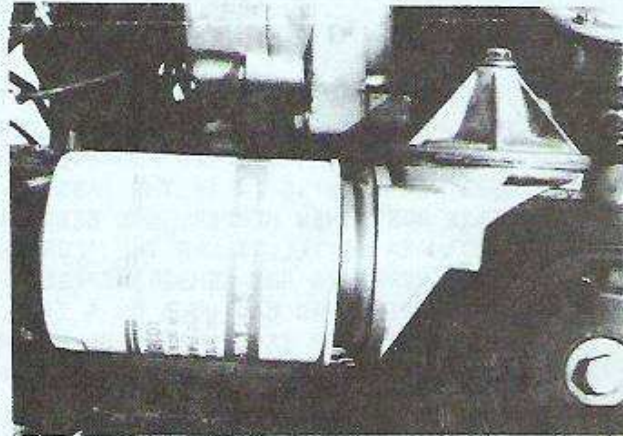

BRAKES: SERVICE & CARE....MANUAL SECTION 11-6

FLEXIBLE BRAKE HOSES -- coat with "Amorall" to resist cracking. Let it dry between several coats.

STEEL BRAKE LINES....Under floor boards forward and between wheel well, examine for possible rust and abrasion. Clean, inspect and paint or treat with WD-40.

BRAKE MECHANISMS IN WHEELS....A much neglected type of service. Remove wheels & drums and blow out all dust and debris. Blow AWAY FROM FACE so as not to breathe in asbestos dust. Carefully apply Lubriplate to all

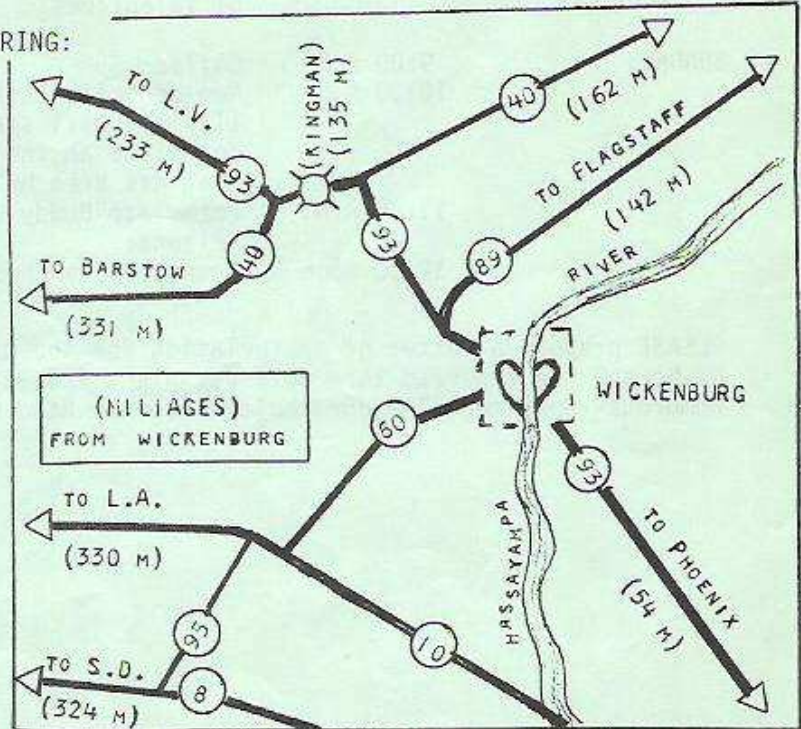
