The Ultra Van Motor Coach Club held a recent regional rally with the San Diego Corvair Club at Indian Hills Camp near Jamul, CA. This was the first official rally at this location for the Ultra Club and the fifth annual for the San Diego Corvair Club. The event was organized and hosted by Al and Kathy Polus with Jim and Marlene Craig as co-hosts. Each are members of both clubs.

The Ultra Van Motor Coach Club really took this one in stride and showed up with twenty-eight Ultra Coaches plus eight other coaches. A combined total of forty-four camping rigs and guests accouted for the ninety-eight people present.

The event started on Wednesday, April 17 and completed on Sunday the 21st. On Thursday, a large group of the campers drove into San Diego and enjoyed a two hour sightseeing trip around San Diego Bay by boat. San Diego is port to a larger amount of commercial ships than we all had realized. Numerous shipyards were busy reconditioning and building new ships. Tuna boats were tied up at the piers awaiting the next departure date. And even a car, truck and personnel ship from La Paz, Baja California, was noticed in a floating dry dock being sandblasted and reconditioned.

Before lunch the group visited the Star of India, which is one of the oldest three masted sailing ships still afloat. This was quite a treat to walk the decks of a 100 year old ship and while standing on the poop deck imagine yourself steering the helm with the wind in your face and the sails bellowed out and hearing the creaking and groaning of the spars and masts.

The ferry Berkeley was also visited, which is still in the process of being restored. The ship's Engineer actually ran the engine for us and what a sight that was. I thought I had seen a large connecting rod, but that engine had four of the largest ones ever.

With a misty rain threatening morning behind us we sought out the warm shelter of Anthonys Fish Grotto on the wharf and enjoyed a sumptuous fish dinner.

On the return to "Indian Hills Camp", a short tour was made of Seaport Village, its boating mooring area for privately owned units and the new International Hotel. These areas are places to see on your next trip to San Diego.

The daily morning coffee break was enjoyed by all. The gals treated us to a variety of desserts to enjoy with the coffee.

Fridays technical session was taken up by a demonstration of some excellent lubricating oils and greases shown by Mr. Hans Bothke from Pro Tec. Not one of the campers had an oil or grease that would equal or surpass the test designed by Pro Tec. Quite impressive.

That evening we all traveled to Barrett Junction Cafe to enjoy a very good fish dinner with all the trimmings. They served all you could eat of the fish and everyone came away stuffed.

A nice campfire and a couple of movies finished the day. One of the movies was the Corvair Journey of "From Here to There". If your club hasn't seen it, contact Marsh Hesler of the San Diego Corvair Club. It is loaned free except for shipping.

Saturday was spent enjoying a great coffee break, a general technical session, kicking back and taking it easy, kicking tires and catching up on the latest from all the friends. The ladies also spent extra time making items during their crafts session and enjoyed what little sun was shining at the time.

That evening a big potluck dinner was held and enjoyed by all. And desserts, Wow some of the best! After the dishes and food was cleared away and the fire built up larger, a "Mystery Gift" program was held and many surprises were given away. Some gifts exchanged hands several times. A sudden rain shower brought the program to an early close and sent most everyone running for their camp. Five minutes later the showers stopped and several people stayed at the fire and enjoyed another hour of wood burning and talking.

Sunday's coffee break was attended by only a few people since a lot of the campers had already left. Good-byes were said and camp was empty by 1:00 P.M.

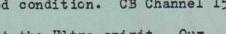

AFTER SNOW SEASON

Here we are in spring time already, the snows are diminishing, hopefully in your area, the countryside is taking on a new cover of green and its about time to start thinking about those trips you have always wanted to take in the "Ultra".

In order to do that, there are some maintenance checks that should be done first, so that we can be assured of a safe and trouble free trip.

The following is a list of tasks and checks that I consider the basics and of course you will probably add more of your own, just for your particular unit.

- 1. Wash and clean exterior and interior.
- Check for water leaks and repair same at time of washing exterior. Visually check sealant at all seams, especially on roof (be careful on that ladder).
- 3. Liquid wax the exterior (type of wax that you add to your wash water).
- 4. Flush out your fresh water tank. Add 5-10 gals. and check operation of all the water pumps. Look under the cabinets and other hidden areas for water leaks while system is pressurized. Check under coach for leaks in all the tanks.
- 5. Service and clean the bathroom units. Install a fresh deodorizer for the bathroom. Check the cabinet and store in fresh toothpaste, paper and etc. And don't forget that first aid kit.
- 6. (a) If you haven't already done so (prior to winter storage), run the engine to normal operating temp. Drain the oil and change the oil filter.
 - (b) Verify condition and tightness of blower belt. Replace it if there are any signs of cracking, fraying, oil contamination and etc.
 - (c) Lube the blower and idler pulley bearings. (See following tip on lube tool details).
 - (d) Check all rubber hoses and electrical wires in engine compartment for cracking, loose connections, chaffing and etc.
 - (e) Remove air filter/filters, blow clean or replace as necessary.
 - (f) Check auto. trans. fluid for proper level (only at normal operating temp.). If fluid smells like something burnt, change it.
 - (g) Check rear axle and 4 speed trans for proper fluid level as applicable.
 - (h) Check tightness of all fuel line connections at carb. (especially the large nut on carb. that gas lines attach to). Careful now, when tightening the nut.
 - (i) Verify that carb. air filter container is sealed properly to the carb.
 - (j) Lube all throttle linkage (lubriplate is best heavy oil last choice).
 - (k) Clean and lube (with lubriplate) all throttle, clutch and emergency brake cables under coach.
 - (1) Check throttle cable for cutting into lower side of alum. tanks repair as necessary.
- 7. (a) Check front shocks for looseness or breaks at lower connection point.
 Check for heavy rust on exposed chrome shaft of shocks. Clean and
 lube as required. Change shock if excessive oil loss is evident.
 - (b) Check all front suspension attach bolts for looseness or evidence of movement (rust or dark stain around head of bolt or nut). Adjust to proper torque as necessary.

- (c) Clean and lube all suspension and steering connections (use caution if lubing the steering bellcrank on left side too much pressure has been known to crack the casting).
- (d) Jack front wheels off ground and check wheel bearing for looseness adjust as necessary. Spin wheel by hand and verify that bearing is smooth and quiet - replace if suspect of rumbling, rough, noisy and etc.
- (e) Check steering gear box for proper lube. Note: Visually check all tires for proper wear - have alignment shop confirm any suspected problem - correct as necessary.
- (f) Check tires for proper inflation don't forget that spare tire. Check for jack and lug wrench.
- (g) If it has been a long time (in excess of 8-10,000 miles since you inspected the rear "U" joints better do it now.) Any rust stain around the bearing cup inner seal area is a sure sign you have a problem.
- (h) Jack rear wheels off of ground, check wheel spindle bearings for proper adjustment, roughness or noise. If all appears well and your spindle assy is modified with a grease fitting - remove wheel and brake drum and lube as necessary.
- (i) And for those with the capabilities, disassemble the spindle assy, clean and lube as necessary and reassemble to the proper preload.
- (j) Check brake fluid reservoir for proper level.
- 8. Clean the windows check operation and condition of the windshield wipers.
- Level the coach, check propane connections for leakage. Fire off the wall heater, refrigerator, store, oven and water heater. Check all for proper operation - make adjustment and repairs as necessary.
- 10. Fill fuel tank with at least 10 gals. of good fresh gasoline, throw in some fresh vittles, the dog or cat and the wife not necessarily in that order and hit the road to "Anywhere America". Good Luck and Happy Ultraing see you in Minden, NB at the national.

Jim also acted as Club President---in the absence of our elected "Head-Man" Dan, who - with Betty - was unable to attend. The EXTRA LARGE attendance was great, too - 46 rigs.

No doubt there will be a special RALLY REPORT, so we'll just mention a few highlights: The huge bonfire each evening, the exchange-gifts, the Color-Slides and Movies, the surprisingly complete ANIMAL ZOO, the usual Craft, Technical, and Financial meetings, the GOURMET dinner, and the very impressive Sunday morning SERVICES by the <u>Science-graduate</u> Director of Indian Hills. We enjoyed the above visitors, plus all the other friends and relatives who stopped by.

The FIRST AID CHART shown here comes from the Red Cross recommendations for each TYPE of emergency. It is always good to know exactly what to do (or NOT do) in case of need. It is best to MEMORIZE each procedure BEFOREHAND.

By the way, we enjoyed a long discussion about American SNAKES (reptiles) by the Director of Indian Hills. He stated that 16-people died last year from rattlesnake bite. The only other poisonous snake in the U.S. is the Coral snake. Contrary to public opinion, snakes do NOT jump --- 1/3 of coil remains on the ground, 2/3rds strikes. He had a very good display of reptile specimens. Our speaker stated that a really GREATER everyday DANGER from venom was that of BEE STING, 68-people DIED in the U.S. last year from bee "bite". The poison buildsup in one's system --- one bite is bad, the next is worse, etc. After seven (7) stings, you have ONLY 5-MINUTES to inject an anti-body or special serum to neutralize the bee "venom" before death. Anyone stung by a bee several years ago, should remember how many TIMES -- in order to KNOW his potential chance for survival in event of another sting. Bee Serum Kits are available.

world's FIRST 100% transistorized ANNOUNCING MEGAPHONES ever built. My cost of it was a little over \$100 then (same as about \$300 today I guess), but it has done a great job all these years. It is not very satisfactory for meetings or programs -- but has almost a half-MILE range for announcements.

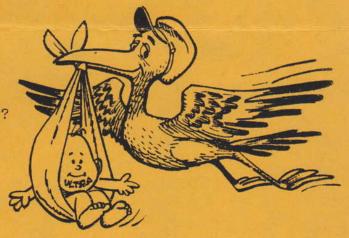
Guess most everyone knows about the Club's <u>OLSON PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEM</u> that is available for any Rally activity or meeting. It works on either 12-volts DC or 120 AC. It is quite heavy - - have been carrying it in one of the "holds" under the floor in #603. I built a special wood-grain <u>Case</u> for it with the dual-speakers <u>enclosed</u> - to facilitate handling and set-up. The microphone came apart during use at the late <u>National Convention</u> in Arkansas but was able to repair it for future club use. It is a very satisfactory PA System when properly set up. <u>As with all such Systems</u>, Mike "technique" is the basis for successful sound amplification -- but it's <u>EASY</u> to learn.

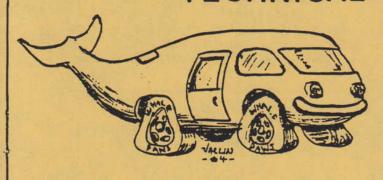

Since I have no experience with the V-8 engined Ultras I would appreciate hearing from any of you that do have one of those models. So if you have any helpful tips that you would like to pass on, please forward them to me.

Also I would like to see some articles on conversions to the 4-speed transmission. In addition to reworking the rear suspension trailing arm assembly I need tips on how to do away with the turnbuckles, how to add a shock mount to the rear of the arm and etc.. Several members have done these conversions, so let's hear from you.

Flash-Flash-Stop-Possible Fire In The Coach

In Ernie Newhouse's last Ultra Postscripts he made note of a possible defective part in the Ultra propane system. In case you missed it in the last issue or have forgotten about it, here it is again:

"Safety First, At the local Rec-V-Dealer yesterday they recommended that we check our <u>Propane Regulator</u> - if it happens to be a <u>REGO #210</u> the factory had sent out a flyer that these were prone to failure and could admit high pressure liquified gas to the heater, stove, etc.. #606 Ultra is OK. The #210 was produced before 1973. The <u>REGO Manufacturer</u> has a special toll free number - 1-(800)-638-CPSC or 1-(800)-638-2772, if any member has a question. Looks like REGO will install replacements free."

Whale Tip: Summer 1-85, Dometic Refrigerator Servicing (Ref. Manual-Section 4, Page 4-6 through 4-9)

Page 4-6 through 4-9) Most of the Ultra's came equipped with the Dometic refrigerators and they have given good service through the years, but they do require an occassional servicing. The following are a few things that you can do that will keep it running great. This will also apply to other makes of refrigerators.

First, Let's remove the burner assembly (See sketch) for cleaning and adjusting. Working from outside of the Ultra through the access door for the refrigerator, remove the sheet metal cover that protects the burner from excessive air movement. Remove the bolt that holds the burner assembly to the refrigerator. NOTE: Prior to unscrewing the burner, make a mental/visual note of the air adjusting ring position in relation to the air holes in the burner.

Second, Remove the burner barrel and jet from the burner base, clean both with alcohol and air pressure only. "Do not use wires or other objects to clean the jets. If the jet is obstructed and cannot be blown out with the air, replace it". (Quote from Dometic Service Bulletin #566, Dated 8-9-66) Personally I would

use a piece of fine screen wire and make an effort to remove the obstruction before actually replacing it.

(6) The air-intake of the burner should be adjusted by means of the air adjustment rings so that a slight roaring sound is heard and so that the flame has a bright blue crown at it's base. (See above)

Third, Prior to reinstalling the cleaned burner and jet unit, locate the baffle in boiler tube, which is directly above the burner assembly when it is installed. Shake the baffle and rattle it around to break loose as much rust as possible. A half inch diameter bottle brush can be used to assist in cleaning the tube also. (Flaking rust falling into the burner reduces its efficiency)

Fourth, Reinstall the burner and jet, adjust air ring to previous location. Install assembly to the holding bracket. Verify that the thermocouple is located 1/8 to 3/16 inch above the top of the burner head and about 1/8 inch off center to one side.

Fifth, With Ultra leveled, fire off burner and adjust as noted in item (6) of the sketch.

Sixth, Reinstall air shield on completion of adjustments.

<u>Final</u>, If your unit has sat dormant for a year or more or will not cool down properly, remove the complete refrigerator and turn upside down for 24 to 48 hours then reinstall. Fire it off and if it still doesn't cool down properly, start looking for a new unit. (Upside down trick is recommended by Cometic)
