Ultra Van National Rally 2026

Even though you think it's early, it's definitely time to think about the 2026 National Rally.

Anyone or group can host a Rally. But, the location rotates and coordinates with the Corsa Division where the CORSA Convention is being held. (The included states are listed in the bylaws, https://ultravan.org/wp-content/ uploads/2022/07/2022-bylaws.pdf starting on page 5)

For location and dates, there are two choices: it can be held either within a day's drive (~200 miles) and right before or right after the CORSA Convention, which will be at Gettysburg, PA, June 22-26, 2026 (Eastern Division). Or, if you chose not to follow those parameters, it still must be located in the corresponding CORSA region (but anywhere), BUT must not be earlier than August 15 nor later than October 10.

There are several experienced former Rally hosts to provide advice and answer questions, plus a detailed set of guidelines

Keep in mind, the dates and location must be published nine months before the start of the Rally.

Hi Everyone,


All of us in the frozen North have all our play toys put away until warmer weather. And then -----

TECH TIP NUMBER: 2025-02 SUBJECT : Windshield Installation (CGC windshields)

UV MANUAL SECTION: 01-05 AUTHOR: Chuck Hanson #460

The key to a good windshield installation is finding an installer with experience in curved gasketed glass. Newer windshields are simply set in adhesive, and less experienced installers will have difficulty with Ultra Van windshields, so be sure

and pick a company with a skilled installer.

If you choose to do the job yourself, we have a couple of good Tech Tips, the most recent by Norm and Brenda Standal, Tech Tip number 2015-07, detailing their procedure on UV480.

Remember, if doing this yourself, patience, planning and 6 hands if you have them will make it a success.


Norm's installation used the uncut full length all corners curved glass using a narrow center piece set in silicone.

Originally, the factory took the full-sized Step Van style of windshield and cut them down from to be used with an approximately 26-1/2" x

22" tall center piece. This was held in place vertically with an assembly of rubber and stainless-steel strips, held in place with machine screws and nuts. I believe many Ultra Vans are still using this technique. Quite a few cracked after replacement, as the glass must not lay up against the screws as this will crack the glass panels.

The best advice for these new style windshields is to get the curved side panels installed in their permanent position in the perimeter gasket, then measure the center space allowing for clearance from the screws. Note: Each install will be slightly different, so the center glass does not always fit back in perfectly. Fortunately, it's flat glass and can easily be made to order

by your glass installer.



I did this many years ago and have had no problems since.

Here are the part numbers for the recommended gasketing, which is

Perimeter: AS-1216 Lock strip: AS-937

Optional one-piece perimeter: AS-1522



All come in 50-foot rolls, which will do two complete windshield perimeters. The center gasket requires six feet of part# AS-1488 per Coach and the same locking strip. You may be able to buy smaller quantities.



Suggestions:

- 1. Make a list of what you must do to make your UV drivable and safe. That is all that counts to start.
- 2. It also helps you mentally if you clean it up, at least some.
- 3. Do you need anything, both advice and/or parts? Put your requests to the club. Join either/both Facebook groups, Ultravan Tech Talk or Ultravan Owners, or email the club office, uvmcc membership@yahoo.com.
- 4. If you need to order parts, do it now.
- Get the UV ready for the parts you are expecting. Don't waste time.
- 6. When the parts arrive, go to work, and don't stop until that phase is finished.
- Once you start, keep going. Again, the key is drivable and safe. Put the cosmetic things on last.
- 8. If possible, divide the work with someone. Example, one could concentrate on the galley or cosmetic work while the other works on something mechanical.
- 9. After it is drivable and safe, make sure you have a comfortable bed. That seems to kill a lot of owners' love for their coach when they don't have a comfortable place to lay their body, especially after a long drive. Nothing else much matters. Bring or buy some nice comforters, soft sheets, and good pillows. A new mattress or even just a thick mattress topper can make all the difference (experience speaking now).
- 10. Quit talking about all the work you have to do and get in there and start it.

warranty. Complete with over and under temperature protection. Group 31 battery case. Maximum discharge 100A continuous. Maximum charge current 50 Amps, 20 Amps optimum.

I decided this was just too good an offer to not take advantage of. My HQST 100AH 22 lb. battery only cost me \$164.24 including a 10-year warranty. They let me know that I can share my link that will save anyone 5% ordering from them with that link. Note that they do not charge for shipping these batteries. Please let me know if you are thinking of purchasing something from them, as they have several solar items on sale. If you do use my link, I get 4% for referring you.

Then a couple more days later from Jerry Mello:

This looks like a great deal for house batteries, but it doesn't look like it was meant to be used as a starter battery or to be recharged from an automotive alternator.

(Tech Editor note) Not all LiFe (lithium iron) batteries are suitable as automotive cranking batteries. Be sure to check with battery supplier.

Steering: I have been fighting it and wondering about it for a couple of years now. I've been under it trying to find something loose or worn but didn't find

anything. I did find a couple of shocks leaking so this spring I replaced all shocks but that didn't help, So, I went to the manual again. I removed the floorboards that were over the steering gear box and could see the gear box was twisting a little. So back to the manual. I found there were a couple of fixes in there. I came up with







an idea to put a piece of aluminum angle and 2" exhaust clamp on the right side of the gear box housing where the shaft comes out to stop the twisting. Now everything is good.

The work on The Whale #460 drivetrain swap is finally starting to come together! The structural revisions are complete. The suspension, including modified trailing arms with Subaru brakes and wheel bearing assemblies are in. Modified Subaru

CV Axles are in. Airbags and 4 shock absorbers are in. The rebuilt 5 speed automatic, with center differential and rear output deleted by Specialisedparts.com in Alberta, is installed to engine. The motor and transmission mounts installed to the fortified engine bay. The Subaru 3.6-liter H6,







with 5-speed automatic are installed in the engine bay.

I just got the adaptors for the brake lines and fuel lines made up today by the Parker Hose guys, so the low- and high-pressure pumps are ready to install, as well as the new brake lines, including line lock for the fronts....

Next steps are the radiator, which will be a custom build by Motor Mission in Las Vegas, and the rebuilt wiring system and computer controls, by AGT ENGINEERING in Australia, which are all here and ready to go.

Then, a thousand other details, and I expect to make it to the National Rally in Pismo Beach in May!



TECH TIP NUMBER: 2025-01 SUBJECT : Ultra Van Tow Bar Subframe

UV MANUAL SECTION: 19-04 AUTHOR: Mike Callahan #452

I read the tech article about building a subframe to tow my Ultra Van in case of a breakdown.

It was not detailed enough for me to build one, and no list of materials was the first problem. I made two attempts to get someone from the Ultra Van FB page to send me some details of their design.

I got one response, and it was from the Facebook page. It did not have a list of materials, and the person had built only part of it and had not tried to tow with it.

So, I decided to design and make my own using the information that I could gather from the sources listed above.

First, I made a template from 2"x4" s of the length and angle that I needed. Then I measured the width that I needed. Then I went to the scrap metal salvage yard and found some material that I was sure would take the weight, tension, and sideways pressures that it would be experiencing.

I found a 2"x2"x1/4" angle iron and 2"x2"x1/4" square box iron. I measured and cut the pieces, and stick welded them together and installed them. Now I'm going to find a bumper to bolt to the front that can be easily removed when needed.

Details:

- (2) 2"x2"1/4" angle iron 46" each to bolt to the front axle
- (4) 2"x2"x1/4" angle iron 2" each to weld to the rear of the 2"x2" tubing to bolt to the rear angle iron.
- (4) 2"x2"x1/4" angle iron 2" each to weld to front square tubing to attach the hitch
- (2) 2"x2"x1/4" square tubing 33" each cut at an angle to make the subframe
- (2) 2"x2"x1/4" square tubing 26" each cut at an angle to extend and raise the subframe to clear the front and raise it to the recommended height of a standard hitch
- (1) 2"x2"x1/4" cut 46" to weld to the front of the subframe that will be the point to attach the towbar

Step 1: measure, cut and drill the two angles 46"each with 9/16-inch holes 36" on center. They will attach to the cross members. There are two pieces of aluminum angle iron that are bolted to the front cross member. Remove the nuts and washers, the bolts are 36" on center and 9/16" diameter. Measure the distance from the top of the aluminum angle to the center of the bolt and use that measurement to drill the hole in the iron angle. Install and attach using the nuts you removed.

Step 2: Make a template to get the length and angle for the subframe pieces that come forward.

Step 3: Use the template to cut the 2"x2" square tubing to length and the correct angle to raise the subframe up to the level needed and come close to the body. My pieces were 33" cut at an angle and 26" cut at the same angle and rotated 180 degrees to mate. Then I welded them together.

You should have the two angle irons bolted in place and the forward-looking pieces welded at an angle. I used a floor jack to hold each piece in place and marked the area that I would drill holes to bolt these pieces to the angle iron. Remove and drill three-eighths inch holes in square tubing and 4 matching holes in the angle iron. Reinstall and bolt them together. The forward pieces should be close, but not touching the body of the Ultra Van.


Step 4: Measure the angle you need to trim the fronts of the forward pieces you just bolted to be perpendicular with the ground and at a comfortable distance from the coach body. The final piece of square 2"x2" tubing with the brackets will be welded here.

Step 5: Cut four pieces of 2"x2" angle iron two inches each and weld them to the front tubing that will be attached to the coach's front and used to attach the removable towbar. The distance apart and the distance between them will depend on your tow bar. Cut four more pieces of the angle iron to be welded to the square tubing and then bolt to the rear most angle iron.

Step 6: Remove and weld it and reinstall.

I did not want to remove the bolts in the cross member and just the nuts. I figured it would be difficult to reinstall them and mine were long enough to have more than a nuts width of threads.

My coach has bolts facing forward on the back and rearward on the front cross member, so I welded the forward pieces to the front angle and bolted it to the back angle so I could install it and remove it without welding under the vehicle. I used four more pieces of the 2"x2" angle welded to the forward pieces, then drilled a three-eighths inch hole in each and bolted them to the rear angle as stated in second half of Step 5.











NOTE: These were the dimensions and layout for MY Ultra Van #452. Yours may be different. Use these measurements as a guide. Make your own template and measure your own vehicle.

Unfortunately someone on YouTube thinks the Ultra Van fits into the category of the Ugliest RV. Watch and see what you think. There are two versions

Simple RV Spring Cleaning Tips To Get You Ready For The Road

Spring

Get your RV ready to hit the open road this travel season with these simple RV spring cleaning tips. Ready, set, clean!

Throw open the windows, put on some tunes, and let's get cleaning!

Start by gathering your materials. There's no need to use harsh chemicals or a different product for every surface. I find that a few simple


cleaning supplies are all I need for my RV spring cleaning.

All-Purpose Cleaner. My favorite

brand is Mrs. Meyer's Clean Day. It comes as a concentrate or pre-mixed in a spray bottle. I use this to clean everything from the vinyl ceiling to the Cleaning wood floor.

> Seventh Generation Dish Soap. You would be surprised by how many things you can clean with a simple bowl of dish soap and hot water.

Seventh Generation Powerful Cleaner. This product is perfect for cutting grease and grime in the kitchen. It's great for cleaning the stove and microwave.



Baking soda and water. A simple paste of baking soda and water works wonders when it comes to removing tough stains from your stove, oven, or sink.

Microfiber cloths, sponges, clean cloth towels, and paper towels - for all your wiping, scrubbing and drying needs.

Okay...we've gathered our cleaning helpers, let's get down to business!

Clean ceiling fans and wipe down ceilings

Ceiling vents and fans collect an amazing amount of dirt! We have two MaxxAir Fans in our RV with one in the bedroom, and one in the living room.

We use these fans nearly every day to move air around and cool us down in the warmer months. All of this use results in a lot of dirt and dust build-up on both the blades and the screens.

Here's my process for cleaning the ceiling fans. If you have a different brand fan in your RV, or ceiling vents with no fans, you may need to alter this method slightly.

Remove the screens by lining up the plastic tabs and pulling the screen down.

Clean the screens in the sink by gently running a sponge over them with warm, soapy water.

Remove the plastic fan blades. The MaxxAir has a nut in the middle of the blade that holds the blade in place. Simply remove the nut with a wrench and the blade slips off.

Clean the blades with warm, soapy water.

Now that the screen and blades are out of the way, you can clean the fan housing using an all-purpose spray and a microfiber cloth.

Replace the blades and the screen, step back and admire your handiwork.

To clean the ceiling, I use a multi-purpose spray and microfiber cloth. Look for dust and dirt in the corners, above window coverings, and around overhead cabinets.

Wash windowsills, screens, panes, curtains, and/or blinds

Next, I like to tackle the windows. Like the ceiling fans, RV windows tend to get a lot of use and collect a lot of dust. Sometimes I feel like I could wash the windows daily and still not keep up with the dirt!

I usually wash my RV windows on a monthly schedule, but every six months or so I like to do a deep cleaning that involves removing all the screens and washing the entire window inside and out. It's amazing how much

brighter it feels inside the RV when the windows and screens are clean.

Remove the window screens and wash gently with warm soapy water. I find the best place to do this is in the shower. Wipe them dry with a clean towel.

Clean the inside of the window casing and the windowsill with multi-purpose spray. Spray and wipe the windowpanes with a glass cleaner both inside and out.

Clean the window coverings. If you have cloth curtains, remove and either wash by hand or have them dry cleaned. If you have mini-blinds wipe them with a microfiber cloth or microfiber duster.



Clean fridge and defrost freezer

Now we move onto the kitchen. Even though it's small, this area of my RV gets a ton of use. I do clean in there daily, but occasionally, it needs a deep clean.



When you have too many items packed tightly in your RV fridge, it doesn't run efficiently. It also makes it easy for things to get shoved behind other things and potentially get lost. (Even in a small RV fridge this happens to me all the time.

I try to keep the clutter to a minimum and wipe down any big spills with a soapy sponge or disinfecting wipes weekly. But for RV spring cleaning I in-

tensify the process by removing everything from the fridge and giving it a thorough cleaning. Pro tip: try not to do this when the fridge is close to empty.

If your RV has been stored for the winter it will already be empty so you can skip the first step, but after months of use, I'm sure it could benefit from a good cleaning.



Remove all items from the fridge.

Take out the shelves and drawers and wash them in the sink with warm, soapy water.

Wash the inside of the fridge with warm, soapy water and a sponge. Dry with a microfiber cloth.

Don't forget to clean the door seals. If you live in a humid climate, these are susceptible to developing mold and mildew.

Discard expired or old items. Wipe down any sticky or dirty jars and containers.

Put everything back in a neat and organized manner.

Now we come to the freezer. Not only do RV freezers need to be cleaned and organized on a regular basis, but

they also need to be defrosted. Don't despair! It might sound intimidating but defrosting an RV freezer is a relatively simple process.

Turn off the fridge and freezer power. This will speed up the process of cooling the freezer down and melting the ice build-up. It should only take 30 minutes or less and in that time if you keep the fridge door closed it will stay plenty cold.

Remove all items from the freezer and put into a cooler (I like to use a collapsible soft-sided cooler).

If you have a blow dryer simply blow the heat on the ice and mop up with a sponge as it melts.

If you're like me and don't travel with a blow dryer, then leave the door

open and let the ice melt on its own. Depending on how much ice build-up you have, it should begin to soften in 30 minutes.

Remove the ice and wipe down the inside of the freezer.

Discard any expired or old items and replace everything in a neat and organized manner.

Clean and organize cabinets

Other areas of the kitchen that accumulate dirt and dust at an alarming rate are the inside of cabinets, drawers, and the food pantry. They also tend to get messy and disorganized.

The best way to both clean and organize your cabinets is to remove everything, give them a good wipe down, and replace everything in a more organized fashion.

Consider using clear plastic containers to store loose food items like rice, crackers, flour, beans, and cereal.

Self-sticking shelf paper is a great way to spruce up old or dirty cabinets and drawers. It also creates a smoother surface that is easier to clean.



Deep clean the stove

I finish up my kitchen cleaning with the stove. My RV has a propane range with three burners and an oven. It gets a lot of use since most days I use it to make three meals a day.

So, it gets dirty, and it needs to be cleaned often. Normally I just spray the top with my Seventh Generation Powerful Cleaner, wipe it down, and call it a day. But for my RV spring cleaning, I wanted to go deeper.

Remove the knobs and soak them in a bowl filled with warm soapy water.

Remove the grates and wash them with soapy water. Spray with a degreaser if needed.

Give the stovetop a good scrubbing. Use a powerful cleaner spray and a mixture of baking soda and water for stubborn areas.

Remember that RV ovens do NOT have a self-cleaning function.

Clean or sweep up any crumbs from inside the oven.

Pull out the racks and wash them in hot, soapy water.

Spray a microfiber cloth with a powerful cleaner and wipe down the inside of the oven.

For tough stains, make a paste out of baking soda and water and scrub the inside of the oven. Clean off really well with a wet rag.

Clean the floor

The final step of my RV spring cleaning is the floor. I always save this part for last. If you have carpet in your RV, this would be a good time to steam clean it.

Vacuum the floor and under all furniture.

Lift up the mattress and vacuum under and around.

Use the vacuum crevice tool to get in all the small spaces and tight corners

If you have tile, wood, or laminate, mop the floor until shiny.



Congratulations! Your RV is now spick and span and ready for adventure. Oh...except you still need to clean the outside. I say save that for another day
